Comfort and Encouragement in the Face of Change

"What has been is what will be,

and what has been done is what will be done, and there is nothing new under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 1:9)

Change is hard. It introduces instability into our lives and instability introduces all sorts of different responses in people. For many, change results in fear, some may get angry. Others may welcome it — or so they think. And yet others may just be confused.

Pastoral changes are especially unsettling. The relationship between a pastor and his flock must be one of deep trust, with eternal consequences. You share life's great moments with your pastor — weddings, births, baptisms, confirmations. You also share your deepest griefs — guilt and shame and sin, marital strife, job and family stresses, sickness, and death. Throughout your life your pastor is there to guide you, to guard you, and lead you as an under-shepherd to the One Good Shepherd.

If you take a moment to reflect, Faith has been through a lot over the past few years. After spending *decades* under the care of Pastor Burgland, changes started. Pastor Mullet arrived, Pastor Burgland retired. Then COVID. Now Pastor Mullet is serving a new flock and Faith has had two vacancy pastors in the past nine months. Now we look forward to Pastor Sorenson's arrival. And with his arrival, there *will* be yet more change. It's inevitable! Pastor A is not Pastor B is not Pastor X. They can't be. Each man is different, with his own background and education, experience and expertise; each man is given different gifts from the Lord.

As Christians, what does God say about change and how can we look to Scripture and our Confessions to help us when things get challenging? There are many resources, but here are a few to keep in mind over the coming weeks and months.

First, always remember who is in control, and what He promises us. "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13:8). Christ is in control, and "we know that for those who love God all things work together for good" (Rom. 8:28). Psalm 111 gives a beautiful list of God's goodness and provision throughout all of our life.

Secondly, remember that Christ has called us to live together as one body — *His* body, the Church. With our physical bodies, if one part is unwell, our whole body suffers. This is true of Christ's body, also. In Galatians, St. Paul encourages us, "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (6:2). Just before this, however, he acknowledges sometimes there will be problems, saying, "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness." (6:1). This is a sad, but true fact of life on this fallen earth.

So how should Christians respond *when* (not if!) a problem or disagreement arises? Consider Luther's explanation to the 8th Commandment, "Explain everything in the kindest way;" I prefer the old translation, "put the best construction on everything." While it is true that Luther's admonition here can guide our conversations with each other, it has much more to do with your *internal* dialog. Too often, we are hasty to make assumptions about each other's motivations or actions. Luther is cautioning us against this and is encouraging the opposite approach — to make excuses in our own mind for the actions of our brothers and sisters in Christ. Your pastor needs this from you, too.

If your pastor does something you do like, tell him. We all need encouragement. If he does something you do not understand, ask him. If he does something you don't like, all the more you need to talk *to him*. Christ makes this clear in Matthew 18, His Church Discourse, where Jesus gives us *His* dispute resolution process. Talk to your pastor directly, not with notes or through proxies. Avoid emails and text messages, even phone calls. Be brave, there's really nothing to worry about. Your pastor wants to help you understand. He's here to teach. He has his reasons, but if he doesn't know your concern, he can't set to work addressing it. Does that mean everything you bring to him will be changed? No, probably not, but it can allow him to explain his reasons and to teach you and your fellow parishioners.

Finally, remember Jesus's teaching from Maundy Thursday, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35). In this Christian Church, we love. God is love, and we know what love looks like from Jesus. "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." (1 Cor. 13:4-7). This verse, so often read at weddings, is about Jesus. Jesus is Love. Jesus is patient and kind, humble and deferential. Jesus rejoices in truth. Jesus bears all things. Jesus endured all things — God's wrath for sin and death in your place. We love because Christ first loved us (1 John 4:19) and we forgive each other because we are forgiven.

Dear friends in Christ. Have this mind among yourselves. Give thanks for the shepherds you have been given, but listen the one you now have. God Himself has sent him to you, for you.
